Sibel Kocabasi of West Palm Beach has studied rug-kilim design, natural dyes, conservation and restoration of textiles, traditional embroidery designs, and illumination of manuscripts.

She received her bachelor of fine arts degree in Turkish traditional arts from Marmara University of Fine Arts and her master of fine arts degree in painting from Florida Atlantic University.

Two years ago, she began to work on a bird series. Her birds, at first, were whimsical. Later they became politically inspired portraits. *The Golden Egg*, the last piece of her bird series, represents hope.

The meaning of her work lies in how viewers become aware of the historical and sociopolitical framework that surrounds a given situation, and how viewers are affected by those dynamics.

Stevens addresses the development of technology as it relates to control and personal and societal experience. There are elements of allure but also anxiety.

"In Covert Conversion, I evoke a sense of our current surveillance society, while referencing the media celebration of culture jamming," she said.

He later earned his MFA from Claremont Graduate University in Los Angeles.


Crocco, who works in color pencil, creates highly detailed drawings that often tackle serious issues but strive to maintain a light and often humorous tone.

In *Deep*, Crocco addresses the water crisis and the ongoing debates over water rights while poking fun at the notion that high art needs to be "deep."
